DESCRIPTION OF SERVICE: Educators, as well as childcare and medical professionals, law enforcement, clergy, child welfare professionals, and others who work with children are mandated reporters of suspected child maltreatment, abuse, or neglect. According to NDCC 50-25.1-03, "a report is required when a reporter has knowledge of or reasonable cause to suspect that a child is abused or neglected, if the knowledge or suspicion is derived from information received by that person in that person's official or professional capacity." The State of North Dakota does not require that those who report include their name within the report of suspected child maltreatment, and any person who suspects a child has been abused or neglected is able to make a report. All reports made in North Dakota are confidential and must be made available to a parent, the child's guardian, and any person who is the subject of a report, though the name of the reporter is kept confidential at all times.

The training module featured here; hosted by the North Dakota Department of Human Services, Children and Family Services; outlines the procedures for mandated reporting, including warning signs of child maltreatment, information on where and how to report suspected maltreatment, and guidance on what comes after a report is made to the appropriate entity.
