DESCRIPTION OF SERVICE: The Poverty Simulation is an interactive immersion group experience designed to bridge the gap from misconception to understanding of the realities of living in poverty. In this simulation, participants are assigned to a "family" where they face common challenges and scenarios present when living week-to-week in a low-income household. The objective of the simulation is to promote awareness, increase empathy and inspire local change.

Local community partners partake in this event and assume the role of various community resource stations that participants interact with as they navigate the challenges of life on a low-income budget. Participants will need to complete tasks, like report to work or seek employment, ensure children are attending school or have childcare, pay their rent/mortgage and utilities on time, and ensure their family is fed each and every day. Just as in real life, additional challenges will arise, making these tasks increasingly difficult. A debrief takes place at the end of the simulation, allowing both participants and community partners an opportunity to share their experiences and learnings. Key objectives of this simulation are to increase empathy and improve understanding of facts vs. myths related to the lives of those who live in poverty.
